Q1 2021

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KEY FINDINGS

- 1. The majority of teachers still believe that it won't be safe to send students back to in-person classes until August 2021 or later. This is despite comfort with returning among teachers being at an all-time high since the start of the pandemic.
- 2. Many teachers have considered quitting or retiring from the profession in recent months due to the added stress and challenges of the job as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.
- 3. Optimism regarding the direction K-12 education is heading has increased this quarter with sentiment nearing the highs of just before the start of the pandemic.
- 4. Charter and private school teachers are the most interested in seeking out both pod and tutoring opportunities. Additionally, private school teachers in urban areas are willing to ask for the most money from parents to either facilitate a learning pod for their child or tutor them outside of school hours.
- 5. Teachers tend to give the parents of their students either a 'B' or 'C' when assessing their actions during the coronavirus pandemic. This comes at a time when teachers think students are progressing much worse across categories than school parents.
- 6. School choice policies such as education savings accounts, school vouchers, charter schools continue to still receive very high levels of support among teachers.

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Support for school vouchers also increases when teachers are provided with information, especially for charter and private school teachers.

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Soft support of school vouchers increased by four points this quarter.
